Governor Kemp to Order Shelter In Place

On April 2, 2020, Governor Brian Kemp issued a shelter-in-place order which will be in effect starting Friday, April 3, 2020 and continuing through Friday, April 13, 2020. This means remaining in their residences and taking steps to limit social interaction to prevent the spread or infection of COVID-19. Ordinance: All residents and visitors of Georgia are required to remain in their residences. This order supersedes all previous orders. You can find more information [here](#).

What Businesses & Professionals must cease in-person contact with the public during this time:

- bars & nightclubs
- gyms & fitness centers
- bowling, theatres, and live performance venues
- dine-in services at restaurants and private social clubs (e.g., bars, clubs, etc.) pickup, and delivery are permitted
- estheticians (waxing, threading, cosmetic treatments, etc.)
- hair designers & body art studios (tattoo parlors)
- barber shops, beauty shops and salons - including home services
- cosmetology, hair design, barbering, esthetics, nail care



3/27/2020 Covid-19 Update:

In case you're wondering, the pandemic isn't over. It's not even close to being over.

The number of cases continue to grow. We are experiencing about the same number of ambulance runs each day and ER visits in our local hospitals, but the acuity is higher (people are sicker than usual).

We don't know precisely how many cases are in Sandy Springs since the post office addresses for us all say Atlanta (check your census forms), so our statistics are lumped in with the City of Atlanta (please complain to the PO and our congressional delegation, asking the Federal government to recognize that Sandy Springs exists).

We have given Public Health our zip codes, so we hope soon to get a break out to help us track our cases.

While no one is reporting exhausted supplies, hospitals still face a shortage of Personal Protective Equipment (masks, gowns, face shields, etc.). This is concerning. Also, Georgia has still not gotten enough tests to allow large scale testing.

A drive through testing facility for those in the priority categories (elderly, first responders and health care workers only for now) will open soon in Sandy Springs. However, you will need an approved order before you can be tested at these facilities, so don't just drive over without one.

Law enforcement is reporting scams offering tests, cures and protective equipment on line or by robocalls. Don't fall for them. They simply want your credit card information so they can steal from you.

MEANWHILE, IT IS CRUCIAL TO REMAIN AT HOME AND WHEN OUT WALKING OR INTERACTING WITH OTHERS, STAY A MINIMUM OF 6-FEET AWAY!!!

Most people are adhering to this request as evidenced by the low traffic volume we are experiencing. THANK YOU...but prepare to continue doing so for several weeks.

A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR RUSTY PAUL

This is a poignant time in our community. With a speed unimaginable, we are in the grip of a virus that has been fierce and widespread in its attack. Georgia Governor Brian Kemp has issued a Shelter-in-Place Order, which remains in effect through April 13, 2020. I implore you to follow that directive.

Stay at Home.

Yes, you are permitted to go to the grocery and pharmacy, but limit who goes and how often. When out, enforce the six-foot distance between you and others. Use disinfectant wipes to clean surfaces you need to touch. Wash your hands as soon as possible. These actions save lives.

In the weeks and months ahead, we will continue to deal with the effects and after-effects of COVID-19. This disease will impact us on a personal level. It has dealt a heavy blow to our local businesses, many of our residents have lost jobs, and we are still in the process of working our way to the epicenter.

It is a long road, and one that remains uneven as we navigate the unknown, but I am confident in our community's resilience and know that we have the fortitude to work together to come through this.

We need to level the curve. For the next two weeks, take a pause. Stay Home. Stay Safe.

Georgia Department of Revenue Alcohol Retail Licensee FAQ

Can a restaurant, brewpub, beer growler or other consumption-on-premises retail licensee sell alcoholic beverages for carry-out purposes or through a drive-in window?

A restaurant, brewpub, beer growler or other consumption-on-premises alcohol licensee may sell wine and beer in UNOPENED packages only to customers for carry-out purposes or through its drive-in window, except:

- (a) On a day or at any time when the sale of package beer or wine is prohibited by law; or
- (b) At any location which is within distances to grounds or buildings of alcoholic beverages is otherwise prohibited by law.

A restaurant, brewpub, beer growler or other consumption-on-premises alcohol licensee is prohibited from selling distilled spirits for carry-out purposes or through a drive-in window.

Can a grocery store or package store sell and deliver alcoholic beverages for carry-out purposes or through a drive-in window?

Yes, a grocery store may sell wine and beer in packages to customers for carry-out purposes only. A package store may sell beer, wine and distilled spirits in packages to customers for carry-out purposes and through its drive-in window.

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The Community Development department is dedicated to the public safety of our residents, the general public, and our staff during this COVID-19 pandemic. While all city buildings are closed, the Community Development Department will continue operations remotely in an effort to provide continued service to the community.

The following is a summary of our updated policies and procedures to better assist you with the permitting process:

- New Permits:** All new permits are required to be submitted and processed online utilizing the Contractor Access Portal (CAP). All permittees are required to log into an existing CAP account or register for a new CAP account so that a new project can be created and a new permit number can be issued. All submittals and resubmittals are required to be in PDF format and submitted online via the CAP until the project documents are approved and the permit card can be e-mailed to the permit applicant, general contractor and owner.
- Existing Permits:** All existing permits not created using the CAP system, that are currently under review will continue to be reviewed outside of CAP. However, all resubmittals should be e-mailed in PDF format to: permit@sandyspringsga.gov where they will be processed and reviewed by City staff. Once the project documents are approved, the permit card will be e-mailed to the permit applicant, general contractor and owner.
- Developer Meetings:** A developer meeting is available to anyone who has questions regarding any active or proposed permit within the city limits of Sandy Springs. Developer meetings are held every Thursday and are limited to 45 minutes per meeting. In lieu of in

We have made it another week! Use this moment to take a deep breath and congratulate yourself (and team members) on completing a successful week.

COVID-19 Information

As of noon today, the Department of Public Health reported:

- 2,001 cases in Georgia
- 307 cases in Fulton Co.
- 64 deaths

The United States now leads the world in reported COVID-19 cases with 94,238. (per the Johns Hopkins outbreak tracker). We are currently monitoring two nursing homes in the city for possible cases. At city hall, we have one confirmed case reported. Staff in contact with this person were tested as a precaution.

It remains critically important that you follow CDC recommendations to stay at home as much as possible. When you do need to go out, please keep a minimum six-foot distance; wash your hands (often), and wipe down surfaces. Practice cough & sneeze hygiene like your grandmother was watching. We want you safe and healthy.

Over the next week, Fulton County will stand up a drive-through testing site within Sandy Springs. This site is not open to the public. Only individuals with a Patient Under Investigation (PUI) number will be able to be tested at this location. To receive a PUI number, a person must have talked with a doctor, healthcare provider or called the Georgia COVID-19 hotline and a number assigned, and then an appointment made for testing. The testing site is being used to test those most vulnerable, including public safety and healthcare providers.

In meeting today with department heads (who are now very experienced WebEx'ers), Mayor Paul said, "Welcome to the new normal. We are still on the uphill side of the pandemic, and we should all expect numbers to climb over the next several weeks."

As we are learning from outbreaks in other countries and within states in the U.S., COVID-19 is not a quick in and out. We should

Public Works


Crews are expected to complete two projects this week: the Sandy Springs Circle Streetscape and Johnson Ferry Road Intersection project. Their service inquiry calls are down in volume, but the types of calls remain the same: malfunctioning signal, pot hole, squirrel who challenge a car and lost. Staff will be meeting virtually with City of Atlanta Water next week to discuss Atlanta's COVID-19 construction/repair plans.

Recreation and Parks

Staff continues to monitor our parks, which are closed due to their potential as a gathering spot. The team is working on virtual programming (more to come) and are using this time to review forms and documents and take in continuing education through webinars and virtual seminars.

Statistics

As of noon, April 7, 2020 reported by Georgia Department of Public Health

- 8,818 confirmed cases in Georgia
- 1,124 confirmed cases in Fulton County
- 1,774 hospitalized
- 329 deaths (36 in Fulton County)

Testing

- 30,993 – Commercial lab (8,337 testing positive)
- 2,720 in Gphl lab (481 testing positive)

Emergency Management Public Outreach

- Daily monitoring of senior care facilities, nursing homes, and assisted living facilities
 - Collecting data on high risk facilities and people reporting sick
- Identifying locations for Points of Dispensing (if vaccine becomes available)
- Establishing safe protocols for first responders
- Communicating with surrounding jurisdictions and Fulton County

Public Health Efforts

- Section Chief Patrick Flaherty overseeing infection control efforts for the City and is monitoring all employees with symptoms or exposure
- Any Employee who has come in contact with someone showing symptoms, or is showing symptoms themselves, are sent home to self-isolate or self-quarantine
 - Isolation refers to those with symptoms; Quarantine refers to those exposed but with no symptoms
- All Non-Essential employees and those able to telework are working from home
- Daily outreach to senior facilities and local hospitals

Emergency Operations

- The Emergency Operations Center is operational virtually in order to reduce person-to-person contact within the EOC. The EOC is staffed with one certified operational manager during work hours
- Fire stations remain closed to general public: Fire personnel will greet at the door and assist if needed
- Police & Fire personnel continue to report to work and respond to emergency calls for service
- AMR ambulance service continues to meet the requests for transport
 - They have transported 50 possible COVID patients since March 19, 2020
- Currently, 25 first responders are being monitored with only one confirmed COVID-19 case – **SUCCESS!**

CDC Recommendations

- Stay home when you are sick
- Cover coughs & sneezes with a tissue, then throw in the trash can
- Wash hands often with soap & water
- If soap & water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer
- Routinely clean frequently touched surfaces and objects

Help prevent the spread of respiratory diseases like COVID-19.

Avoid close contact with people who are sick.

Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.

Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

Stay home when you are sick, except to get medical care.

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.

 - Permits in commercial areas where in-person contact is not necessary, or where the work has progressed beyond need for contact continues
 - Emergency repairs as needed to mitigate system outages/loss of service
- Field Contractors
 - All non-emergency maintenance activities suspended during shelter-in-place
 - All services remain accessible on emergency on-call basis
 - Use of established emergency response protocols (after-hours | On Call team)
 - Administered by Public Works Superintendents (24/7)

Community Development: Residential Work

- New, single family attached/detached homes are permitted to complete work
 - Families are waiting to move into homes in many cases
- Existing interior alterations on single family attached/detached homes currently underway will be allowed to finish
- Applications currently in process will be allowed to be completed and permits issued
- New applications will be processed, but permits will be held until crisis is over. If applicant can demonstrate a hardship, a release of permit will be considered
- All inspections will be conducted; however homeowner/contractor must maintain a minimum distance of 10-15 feet separation from inspector at all times

Commercial Permitting

- Permits issued for apartment complexes to correct failures and deficiencies will be allowed to be completed as long as all safety protocols are followed
 - Masks and gloves are used and no more than two of the same trade in a unit at one time, with a maximum of six people working in a home at one time.
- Inspire Brands interior alterations are limited to one floor with CO's for previous work on first nine floors – work is permitted to continue
- Homes currently under construction at Aria shall be allowed to complete work
 - No new permits issued
- Work at 6075 Roswell Rd can continue as long as safety protocols are followed
- Staggered residential occupancies are not permitted during the current shelter-in-place directives
